## Dr. Stephen Album | Founder | Director of Islamic \& Early Indian Numismatics

Steve has been serving the numismatic community since 1960. In 1976 he began dealing nearly exclusively in Islamic and Indian coins. He has authored several books including the 1977 saw the release of his complete rewrite of Marsden's Numismata Orientalia Illustrata, a guide to Islamic and Oriental coins with values. In 1993 he published A Checklist of Islamic Coins, now is in its third edition, is the standard for collectors of Islamic coins. Mr. Album is currently a senior fellow at the Worcester College, Oxford, England, and in this position has authored three of the ten volumes of the Sylloge of Islamic Coins in the Ashmolean (Museum) beginning in 1999. In 2003 he was the recipient of the American Numismatic Society's Huntington Award, and is only one of three Islamists to have received this honor. He has twice been the recipient of the Samir-Shamma-prize for Islamic Numismatics, in 2000 and then in 2005. In May of 2004 the Eberhard-Karls-Universität Tübingen in Germany honored Mr. Album with a philosophiae doctoris honoris causae, an honorary doctoral degree in philosophy.
Steve is among the world's leading experts on Islamic and Indian coins.


## Joseph Lang | CEO | Director of East Asian \& Later Indian Numismatics

Joe joined Stephen Album Rare Coins in 2001 and merged his company with Steve Album shortly thereafter. It was under his management of the firm that Stephen Album Rare Coins began operating their successful auctions in 2007. He now directs the firm as the Chief Executive Officer (CEO). Mr. Lang is a preeminent specialist in world coins with expertise in East Asian and Indian Numismatics. Joe serves on the International Association of Professional Numismatists (IAPN) Executive Committee and is the chairman of the Anti-Forgery Committee. He also sits on meetings of the International Bureau for the Suppression of Counterfeit Coins (IBSCC).


## Paul Montz | CFO | Director of World Coins

Paul joined the staff in January 2011. He attended UC Davis from 1975-80, earning bachelor's and master's degrees in Agricultural Science \& Management and Agronomy, respectively. ## Collections Featured In This Auction



The Dr. John W. Lund Collection of Swedish Coins, Part I
Dr. John W. Lund, PE, lived in Norway as a boy from 1947-51 while his father worked at the U.S. Embassy in Oslo. He attended grade school there, where one of his classmates was the present king of Norway, Harald V. During this time he started collecting Scandinavian coins and stamps, especially Norwegian and Danish issues. He later branched out into Iceland, Sweden, Finland, Greenland, Danish West Indies, Faeroe Islands and Tranquebar. His heritage is Danish and, because of his Norwegian schooling, he speaks and reads Norwegian, and has an understanding of the Swedish and Danish languages. So collecting Scandinavian coins and stamps was a natural fit.

He attended the University of Colorado in Boulder and received his Bachelor's in Civil Engineering. From there, he moved on to UC Berkeley where he earned his Master's in Transportation Engineering, and went back to Boulder to get his Ph.D. in Civil Engineering in 1967. It was then that he started his career as a Professor of Civil Engineering at the Oregon Institute of Technology. He served in that post until 1999. He is now an emeritus Professor of Civil Engineering at OIT, and is also emeritus director of the Geo-Heat Center.

John has been offering some of his collections to the market as he is retired and reaching an age where he would like others to enjoy these beautiful coins and stamps. In our Auction 20 we had the privilege of offering his fantastic collection of Tranquebar coinage. Additionally, we offered John's collections of Finland and Danish West Indies in Auction 22. In this sale we feature the first half of his collection of Swedish coins. The pieces offered here are primarily earlier Swedish coins, with the majority of the coins dating between the $13^{\text {th }}$ and $17^{\text {th }}$ centuries AD.


## Selections from The Skanda Collection

The selections from The Skanda Collection that we offer in this sale were acquired by a collector in the United States during the late 1970s and throughout the 1980s. His goal was to establish a general collection of Indian gold coinage that illustrated its history from the very first issue during the reign of the Kushan ruler Vima Kadphises (ca. 105-127 AD) until the last issue by Hanwant Singh, maharaja of Jodhpur, just before the formation of the Republic of India in 1947.

The Skanda Collection was offered at an auction named The Skanda collection of Indian gold coins, Spink-Taisei Catalogue 9, held in Singapore at the Raffles City Convention Centre on Wednesday, 20 February 1991. The Skanda numbers cited in our auction refer to that sale. The collection was dispersed amongst dozens of bidders. Unfortunately, most of the important coins have never reappeared for sale, such as the 1765 mohur, the 1770 fifteen rupee gold coins of the Bombay Presidency, and the Kushan quarter dinar of Kanishka I portraying Buddha on the reverse.

It is fortunate that some of the Skanda Collection coins are once again available for sale, and we are proud to be able to include them in this auction. This group consists primarily of Kushan and Gupta dinars and Kushan quarter dinars, including some splendid examples and a few great rarities. These two series were of limited interest back in 1991, but collector interest has grown immensely since then, and the value of these coins has appreciated greatly as a result.

After the consignor had acquired possession of a house, he discovered the item in a old cabinet. Since he had lived in Hong Kong and China back in the 1980's he took an interest in researching the object, deciphered himself the characters Xian Feng Yuan Bao and concluded that this object could have some historical interest.
The house in question had been acquired in the early 1900's by the previous owner's ancestor after he had made money in the Far East in the second half of the 19th century, where he spent years as director of a trading house. One can assume that this extremely rare item came into the family's possession during this period. In order to learn more about the item, the owner then consulted Mrs. Helen Wang from the British Museum, Department of Coins and Medals, who directed him to Mr. David Hartill who wrote the book "Cast Chinese Coins ". He then searched the internet to see which auction houses specialized in cast Chinese coins and came across our firm's name.

Georg Heinrich von Görtz issued these emergency copper dalers to finance the Great Northern War with Russia. The emergency money was, with a circulation of some 4 million coins, not welcomed by the population and Sweden's government ultimately failed to buy the old coins from the market and to exchange them for coins of a more appropriate nominal value. In February 1719 Görtz had to pay for the general dissatisfation with his beheading in Stockholm. The government's promise to accept the worthless coins as proper payment as soon as peace arrived was not kept after the peace of Nystad in 1721. Coins were still accepted but only for half their nominal value (16 öre), and the remaining coins began to circulate as 1 öre-pieces, some of which were overstruck with the new value. Gold coins are known only of Kachagupta, copper only of Ramagupta. It is also possible that they ruled in different sections of the Gupta Kingdom simultaneously. All coins of "Kacha" were assigned to Samudragupta by virtually all previous scholars.
