COMMENTARY (25 May 1994) — My recent trip to Europe was quite successful. I spent two weeks at Tübingen working on the Rasulid coinage of the Yemen, for a book that I hope to have finished before the end of this year. There has been no significant publication of Rasulid coinage since Nützel's pioneering work in 1891 (reprinted with some additions in 1987). The time is now ripe for a new study, now that the series is becoming better known. In fact, recent discoveries tend to have very few coins that are not already known, and new types or mints no longer turn up with any frequency. I would still be interested in adding to the catalog portion of my study, and would like to hear from anyone with a collection of Rasulid coins that I have not yet catalogued.

I attended the Sotheby sale in London on the 18th of April. It was a good sale, with nearly 200 Islamic lots, nearly all of which found a buyer. Prices tended to average around the estimate, and there was strong competation for many of the coins. Only a couple of coins went for exhorbitant prices, and relatively few went cheaply enough for a dealer to purchase for stock. At the Peus sale in Frankfurt two weeks later, the scene was quite different. Two dealers purchased nearly all the Islamic lots, mostly at several times estimate, most for hitherto unheard-of prices. Even the rich collectors present were disgusted at losing out on most of the coins they wanted, for they were sensible enough not to go overboard. I do not yet know what happened, but if such activity continues, it will have the same depressing effect that the outrageous prices of the early 1980s had on the market.

However, it is fair to say that the supply of inexpensive coins is rapidly drying up. This is in part because of local demand at the place of origin, especially for cheap coins (silver & copper under \$25, gold under \$200). I am afraid that collectors accustomed to buying nice dirhams for \$5-\$10, copper for \$3-\$5, etc., will have to recalibrate their expections. There will continue to be hoard quantities, but increasingly, these will appear at prices significantly above recent levels. The explanation is simply that it no longer pays to export coins to the west for prices that are not noticeably higher (20% or more) than prices offered in the Middle East and India. This has already occurred with common Indian rupees. The massive supplies in the West that were available at prices from \$4-\$10 have dried up in recent years, and new imports will require retail prices in the \$8-\$20 range for the same coins. Western collectors have largely accomodated themselves to this new reality, and I suspect the same will happen with Sasanian and Islamic coins as well. Right now, wholesale lot prices for Sasanian are at retail levels (typically \$11± for average quality coins in lots of 100 or more).

One further reason for this is that lots are now generally combed for rarities before they are sent to the West. In the past, I was able to amortize the prices for common coins by selling off the rarities, but this is no longer possible, with rare exceptions. The market is maturing, and will soon resemble more the established market of ancient Greek and Roman coins than the old flea market style we loved so much!
