

COMMENTARY (24 January 1996) — (from last month) The year 1980 was a pivotal year in the history of the numismatic trade. Already in 1979, the prices of silver and gold were shooting through the roof, due to the audacious attempt by the Hunt brothers to drive up bullion prices and in the process make themselves excruciatingly rich. In 1975 an Umayyad dirham had a bullion value of less than 20¢, but by January 1980 it had peaked at more than \$4. Thus was born the great meltdown, in which untold quantities of gold and silver coin were reduced to metal bars—though my hunch is that the net affect on stocks of even common gold and silver coins was vastly less than widely presumed. But the real qualitative change was in the perception of what a rare coin might be, a hobbyist's curio or an investment commodity. The Reagan 80s saw the zenith of coin investment and investment hype.

The Islamic market was also enmeshed in the pecuniary craze of the time. Auction prices (still mainly at Sotheby's) set new records with each sale, as wealthy Middle Eastern collectors, still awash with new petrodollars, entered the numismatic market in droves. Competition reached uncharted heights, and prices rose commensurately, buttressed by outlandish bullion prices. The early 1980s also saw the first significant growth of a domestic coin market in the oil-rich states, though "serious money" still normally worked its way through the Western, especially the London market. New York had yielded to London, then the favorite entrepôt for wealthy Arabs and other Middle Easterners.

Yet demand was not evenly distributed over all series of Islamic coinage. In particular, gold was very much favored in what was essentially a classic nouveau-riche market. Obscure rarities, especially if poorly struck and difficult to read, were largely ignored, so that serious collectors could still find interesting and rare additions to their collections at reasonable prices. A small but growing number of Middle Eastern collectors were becoming serious in their avocation, and were treated to a field day. The stigma of nouveau-richisme was already wearing off.

But a day of reckoning lay in the lurch. During the early part of 1984, rumors, quickly verified, circulated to the effect that the two biggestbudget collectors, one Lebanese, one Iranian (both residing in Europe), had more or less simultaneously thrown in the towel. The thinness of the market became glaringly apparent, and prices tumbled, in some cases to a fourth or less of 1983 levels. Bargains were everywhere, and little interest was shown. But with large supplies still moving west, in quest of a market that had largely evaporated, collectors had a sublime opportunity to enrich their collections. I was still a collector in those days, and found it hard to resist putting coins into my collection, because the market was unable to recognize rarity with an à propos price.

Paradise was 1985 to 1988. Neither before nor since have I seen so many interesting coins on the market, and for the most part, at such attractive prices. To be sure, some popular rarities, such as the 77 dinar, continue to set price records, and many types that were later to become commonespecially after the opening up of the former Soviet Union—were still regarded as rare and reckoned as expensive (often many times their 1996 price). After all, the market was still quite immature, barely a decade old and still extraordinarily thin. For dealers, these were generally lean years indeed. Old inventory was often costed for more than the current price. While rare coins could be purchased very reasonably, there were few buyers willing to pay enough to cover cost and expenses. Interest rates were high, so borrowed money was prohibitively expensive. Good knowledge and a loyal customer base supported me and many other dealers during those years.

But the disaster of the 1980s was the slab, the plastic encapsulation of a "rare" coin that has been graded and authentically by a presumably neutral third-party grading service. The underlying idea was undoubtedly laudable, to create a certification process that would allow coins to be traded as a commodity, just the prescription so desperately desired by the investment community. A "certified" coin could be bought and sold by anyone, even without the least knowledge of numismatics. Clearly, the victory of the investor was imminent. Wall Street cast an approbative eye on this wondrous process. Investment funds put serious money into rare coin portfolios, as they are called, ... (more later).
