

COMMENTARY (24 June 1996) — (continued from last month) Perhaps the greatest change in the market in the 1990s has been the growth of domestic markets in many of the source countries for Islamic and Indian coins. This is particularly true in India, where tens of thousands of new collectors have emerged in recent years and more than 100 new local numismatic societies have been established. But serious new collectors have arisen in the Gulf states, in Morocco, in Egypt, and elsewhere. The net result for me and other Western dealers specializing in non-Western coins has been that local dealers are increasingly selling directly to collectors in the Middle East and India who formerly bought largely through European and America dealers. At the same time, the supply of coins remains limited, though much augmented in recent years by the omnipresence of the metal detector, despite rather draconian laws that prohibit or regulate their use.

To be sure, there was already much sifting out of the rarities at the source well before 1990, but largely in order to sell the better coins to dealers in Europe and the US or to consign them to auction, especially to Sotheby's and Spink-Taisei. In fact, by the early 1980s, unpicked hoards of early Islamic, especially Umayyad and Abbasid, coins were no longer to be found. Prices for rare dirhams and dinars has already reached a level that justified removing them from hoards at the source. Now, in the 1990s, all sorts of hoards are treated in similar fashion. In the 1970s I regularly purchased one or more unpicked hoards per month, but today I often go a year or more without seeing an unpicked group. That does not mean that good material no longer reaches me, just that the price structure has changed, as the pick of the crop is offered separately and at much higher prices than is the bulk material. On the other hand, once in the while, perhaps increasingly, I am able to purchase a well-constructed collection that was formed in the Middle East or South Asia, though obviously no longer at hoard prices. Ultimately, the market will become totally internationalized, as has long been the case for European coins. However, laws that restrict the ownership and marketing of rare coins will continue to hinder that process for the foreseeable future.

Another development of the 1990s has been the increased demand for hoard material for numismatic and non-numismatic promotions. No one has yet put Islamic dirhams in cellophane packets in a box of Corn Flakes, but modern coins and medals are finding their way into cereal boxes. The 1 July issue of *Coin World*, which arrived this morning, has an article on 1996 Olympic medals in boxes of Cheerios. (to be continued)
